


# HOUCK MANOR & HOLIDAY PARK SEWER EXTENSION PROJECT INFORMATION

Residents will need to apply for a Building Permit from the Township. The permit is on the Township website or can be picked up at the Township Building. Once completed, the permit will need to be submitted to the Township, along with construction plans (provided by your contractor) that outlines the scope of the project. These plans must comply with the 2015 International Residential Code (IRC).

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## KNOW YOUR CONTRACTOR BY MARK SALISBURY, MANAGER, WHT SEWER AUTHORITY

The Houck Manor sewer extension project will get underway in the near future. As you plan your sewer connection, choosing the right contractor for the job is a critical first step in the process. Get at least three quotes for the work you need to have performed, and be sure that each quote is for the exact same work. You'll want to make sure you do the following:

- Verify the quality of the contractor's work in advance
- Spell out in writing what work you want performed
- Agree upon the scope of the project
- Verify and request proof that the contractor is properly licensed and insured in the event something goes wrong
- Be sure to get everything in writing

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## Contractor / Client Checklist

This check list is not all inclusive but provides a base line to obtain multiple bidder pricing to you.

Contractor must provide the following to resident:

1. Proof of insurance
2. Contractor registration with PA Attorney General
3. PA ONE CALL by each contractor 1-800-242-1776 (CALL BEFORE YOU DIG)
4. Unit price for excavation
5. Unit price for rock excavation
6. Unit price to remove landscape (if required)
7. Removal of existing on-lot Septic system will be inspected by West Hanover Township Sewer Authority
8. Contractor to verify If electrical system needs upgraded to 100 amp service (Minimum) by property owner contractor – inspected by Township Building Codes Department
9. Interior home work will be inspected by West Hanover Township Codes Department. Call 652-4841 48 hours in advance to schedule inspection
10. Unit price to patch and repair any holes in foundation structure water tight. (subject to inspection prior to cover)
11. Unit price to remove and restore existing driveway (if required)
12. Unit price to restore landscaping (if required)
13. Unit price to restore any grass removed for this project
14. Contractor must contact Codes Department for permit application information and direction. (prior to install) 640-6080 (Permit fees will be waived for this project only)
15. Contractor work must comply with the 2015 IRC or 2015 IBC, PAUCC as amended for Pennsylvania

The van program does not receive regular funding therefore we depend on donations. When you utilize the service please remember to give the driver whatever you feel you can give. We appreciate any amount and thank you for it.

**Just a reminder there will be no vans running on Monday, September 2, Labor Day; Thursday, November 28, Thanksgiving; and Wednesday, December 25, Christmas Day.**

If you or anyone you know is in need of transportation call 717-652-1702 for more information. Van office hours are Monday through Friday 10:00 am to 2:00 pm so call between those hours to be put on the schedule. If you get the answering machine please leave a message and someone will get back to you.

**The vans run from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm Monday through Friday and we appreciate if you can make your appointments within that time frame. We will take you shopping, hair appointments, and just about anywhere you wish to go...as long as it is within a 15 mile radius of the Township Building. Medical appointments are always a priority so be sure to schedule them as soon as you have them.**

We have only three requirements to use the service. First you must be age 60 or older, second a resident living in the township and third must be able to get in and out of the van with minimal assistance. We cannot take wheelchairs.

## Summer, 2019

Hello from the West Hanover Township Volunteer Fire Company. Just because you may have missed seeing our updates in the Township Newsletter doesn't mean we have been absent from our community. As we roll into summer, here are some updates we wanted to share with everyone. First, we would like to thank the community members who made donations to our Spring fundraisers. We had another successful mailer campaign, and everyone who attended our Casino Night enjoyed an evening of food, drink, and gaming. The money raised by these events is a critical addition to our annual Fire Tax budget. Together, the time and monetary contributions we receive from community members is what maintains fire stations, keeps the fire trucks on the road, and protective gear on our fire fighters.

Another project we recently completed was the mandated replacement of our self-contained breathing apparatus, the air packs that allow us to perform fire suppression or search and rescue activities. In January we replaced all of the air packs on our three fire trucks and our three utility vehicles at a cost of \$300,000. Our old packs were at the end of their fifteen-year service life and needed to be removed from service. After a month of training we were ready to put the new packs in service without missing an emergency call.

The project that may have been a little more notable to community members was the purchase and retrofit of a used engine from the Colonial Park Fire Company. Some residents may have noticed the green and white Engine 33 responding to emergencies. What some resident may not have been aware of is that last November our Engine 36-1 was struck by a tractor trailer on Interstate 81 while on the scene of a vehicle fire. Fortunately, fire trucks are designed to withstand such impacts. None of the fire fighters on board sustained major injuries and all were able to return to work and fire fighting within two weeks. Unfortunately, our engine did sustain major damage and is still out of service for repair. To fill the gap in fire protection, the township purchased the used fire engine from Colonial Park. Once Engine 33 was in our possession we had a full inspection and service performed and completed retrofits to the compartments. Engine 33 may not match our other Engines, but it is allowing us to continue our mission to provide emergency services to the residents of West Hanover Township and the surrounding communities.

Have a safe and enjoyable summer, we will see you on the streets.

## Summer Pet Safety Tips, By Animal League America, June 4, 2018

**Never leave your pet in a car!** Parking in the shade and leaving the windows open is not an option. Even if you are just running a quick errand, in a hot car your pet's temperature can rise rapidly and they can overheat in a very short period of time. It only takes minutes to reach dangerous levels leading to heatstroke and even death.

**Always make sure your pet has cool, clean water available.** This is one of the easiest ways to avoid heat injuries in the summer months. Dogs, and even cats, drink more on hot days, and water warms up quickly, so make sure to change your pet's water often.

**Food and drinks you serve your family and friends may be poisonous to your pets.** Backyard BBQs and pool parties are what we all look forward to during the summer, but keep an eye on what your pet is eating when you get the party started. Dogs and cats can experience severe digestive ailments when a change of diet takes place. **The following products are extremely poisonous to pets: raisins, grapes, onions, chocolate and products with the sweetener, xylitol.**

**Do not walk your dog near fireworks.** Besides the obvious danger, the loud noise can be very scary.

**Do not force your dog into the water if he/she is frightened.** Some dogs do not like to swim. If your dog likes to swim, do not leave him/her unattended. Bathe your dog afterwards to remove all sand, mud, and chlorine. Also, be sure all pool chemicals are stored safely out of reach.

**Do not allow your dog to hang out of the window of a moving car.** Objects such as rocks or tree limbs could seriously injure your pet, or he/she might fall or jump out.

**Do not allow your animals to ride in the back of a pick-up truck.** They could be thrown out, or they may jump out.

**Take your pets inside if there is the possibility of a thunderstorm.** Loud thunder may frighten them, or lightning could strike them.

**Have your pet checked for heartworm.** Though commonly found in dogs, heartworm can affect cats, too. Heartworm disease is more commonly seen in warmer weather. Easily transmitted through insect bites and/or contact with another infected animal, this disease inhibits proper pumping and functioning of the heart muscle, and may cause heart failure if not treated. Have your pet checked and administer a heartworm preventative.

**Check your pet daily for fleas and ticks.** It is important to apply flea and tick prevention to your pet monthly or as indicated on the specific product label of the product that is used. Fleas and ticks can cause anemia, carry other harmful parasites, as well as carry other diseases such as Lyme Disease. There are several options available for flea and tick prevention. Ask your veterinarian which product addresses the specific needs of your pet given its individual environment.

**If your pet likes to relax in the shade of a yard or deck, watch out for yellow jackets, bees, toads, and snakes.** Bite or sting symptoms are usually swelling of the face or affected areas. Once stung or bitten, the pet's skin may start to look wrinkly or bumpy. This is a first indicator and, if not treated by a veterinarian, could result in death due to toxins taking over and shutting down the animal's body or causing air way swelling and suffocation.

**Your pet CAN get sunburn.** This is more likely in white dogs, hairless dogs, and dogs with light colored fur, such as Pit Bulls and Dalmatians. If you have a pet that meets this criteria, it is recommended that you apply sunscreen to your pet before it is allowed to be outside for an extended period of time.

**Keep your dog's paws cool at all times.** Limit the time you let your dog roam in the backyard and outdoors, especially on hot asphalt. Since the ground heats up quickly during the summertime, your dog's body heat can rapidly rise, and sensitive paw pads can get burned.

**Know the signs of heat stress.** In these warm summer months it is best to be aware of the signs of heat stress by exposure to extreme temperatures. Check the animal for signs of heavy panting, glazed eyes, a rapid heartbeat, restlessness, excessive thirst, lethargy, fever, dizziness, lack of coordination, profuse salivation, vomiting, a deep red or purple tongue, and unconsciousness.

### If Your Pet Is Overheating

- Move your pet into the shade or an air-conditioned area.
- Apply ice packs or cold towels to your pet's head, neck and chest or immerse him in cool (not cold) water.
- Let your pet drink small amounts of cool water or lick ice cubes.
- Take your pet directly to a veterinarian.



## 12 Summer Safety Tips for Seniors by Gillian Kruse, a freelance writer in Houston.

The summertime is a time of fun and relaxation for most people. But for seniors, the heat and sun can be dangerous if the proper precautions aren't taken. Here are some great tips that aging adults, as well as their caregivers, can use to make sure they have a fun, safe summer.

**Stay Hydrated** Seniors are more susceptible to dehydration than younger people because they lose their ability to conserve water as they age. They can also become less aware of their thirst and have difficulty adjusting to temperature changes. Remember to drink water often, and be sure to pack some for those long summer drives. Dr. William Greenough, of Johns Hopkins Geriatric Center, says caregivers should make sure seniors are drinking sweat replacement products (that contain salt and potassium) to replace water they lose during the summer.

**Talk to Your Doctor** Check with your medical team to make sure any medications you are on won't be affected by higher temperatures — especially if you don't have air conditioning in your home. Some medications are less effective if stored at temperatures higher than room temperature (about 78 degrees Fahrenheit), and the last thing anyone wants is for a preventable medical condition to become aggravated due to high temperatures.

**Keep Your Cool** Even small increases in temperature can shorten the life expectancy for seniors who are coping with chronic medical conditions. Shopping malls, movie theaters and libraries provide welcome, cool spaces if a senior's own home isn't air-conditioned. They also afford a great opportunity to get out of the house and get some exercise without the exhaustion of the heat. Contact your local Area Agency on Aging to inquire if there are any programs to assist seniors with fewer resources to get air conditioners. "Seniors are much more vulnerable to the harmful effects of heat, as their bodies do not adjust as well to sudden changes in temperature," says Dr. Lubna Javed, formerly of HealthCare Partners Medical Group in Las Vegas. "Some chronic medical conditions and prescription medications can impair the body's ability to react efficiently to rising temperature."

**Stay in Touch** High temperatures can be life-threatening, so communication plays an important role in ensuring the safety of aging adults. Seniors should let friends and family know if they'll be spending an extended period of time outdoors, even if they're only gardening. "Caregivers should check on the health and welfare of their loved ones at least twice a day," Javed says.

**Meet Your Neighbors** Get in touch with those who live in your neighborhood and learn a bit about them and their schedules. If you're a senior, see if a younger neighbor — perhaps even one of their kids — can come by and check on you occasionally to make sure everything is all right. The extra company and friendship that can result is a bonus!

**Know Who to Call** Prepare a list of emergency phone numbers and place them in an easy-to-access area. This way, the right people can be called to help quickly preventing any further issues or preventing medical problems from getting worse.

**Wear the Right Stuff** Everyone, including seniors, should dress for the weather. When it's warm out, some people find natural fabrics (such as cotton) to be cooler than synthetic fibers. Stock your summer wardrobe with light-colored and loose-fitting clothes to help feel cooler and more comfortable.

**Protect Your Eyes** Vision loss can be common among seniors, and too much exposure to the sun can irritate eyes and cause further damage. Wearing sunglasses can protect your eyes from harmful UV rays and preserve your vision.

**Know the Risks of Hyperthermia** During the summer, be particularly cautious about abnormally high body temperatures — a condition known as hyperthermia. Heat stroke is an advanced form of hyperthermia that can be life-threatening. Make sure to know the warning signs and get medical attention immediately if you or anyone you know is experiencing these symptoms:

- Body temperature greater than 104 degrees
- A change in behavior, such as acting confused, agitated or grouchy
- Dry, flushed skin
- Nausea and vomiting
- Headache
- Heavy breathing or a rapid pulse
- Not sweating, even if it's hot out

**Put on Sunscreen and Wear Hats** Everyone, young and old, should wear sunscreen when outdoors. Seniors especially need the extra sun protection to help keep them healthy. Caregivers, family and friends can help by gently reminding loved ones about applying sunscreen and helping to put it on when necessary. Hats are also a great idea, especially for those with light-colored hair and those with only distant memories of a full head of hair.

**Apply Bug Spray** Seniors are particularly prone to West Nile Virus and encephalitis, Factora says. If you live in areas where there are a lot of mosquitoes and where West Nile Virus is present, and if you spend a lot of time outdoors (particularly at night), use mosquito repellent to help reduce the risk of getting bit by a mosquito carrying this virus.

**Exercise Smart** If you enjoy outdoor activities, such as walking or gardening, make sure to wear the proper clothing and protective gear. It's also important to keep track of time. Don't stay out for long periods and make sure to drink even more water than usual when exercising. Also, consider getting outdoor exercise earlier in the morning or later in the evening, when the sun is not at its peak.

If you follow these tips, there's no reason you can't have an enjoyable and fun-filled summer — no matter how old you are.

All complaint forms must be filled out completely and signed by the resident. **The Township will not investigate any anonymous complaints.**

### **OPEN BURNING IN WEST HANOVER TOWNSHIP**

**Fires on public property prohibited.** No person, firm, partnership or corporation shall set or maintain any fire at any time upon any of the streets, sidewalks, alleys or public grounds in West Hanover Township, or burn or cause to be burned thereon any paper, garbage, refuse, debris, boxes, rubbish, foliage, weeds or other material or substance of any kind, unless the person doing so shall be an employee of West Hanover Township authorized to do so.

**Fires on private property restricted.** Open fires shall be permitted upon private property in West Hanover Township under and subject to the following requirements:

- ◆ All open fires in West Hanover Township require a burn permit issued by the West Hanover Township Fire Marshal.
- ◆ Open fires shall not exceed six feet in diameter and six feet in height and must be 50 feet from any structure and 25 feet from any property line.
- ◆ Campfires require a burn permit and shall not exceed two feet in diameter and two feet in height and be a minimum of 25 feet from property lines and structures, automobiles or any combustible materials.

The Burn Permit and information can be found on the Township's website and permits are also available at the Township Building, 7171 Allentown Boulevard. This is no charge for a Burn Permit.

### **ANIMALS RUNNING AT LARGE**

It shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog, cat, or domestic pet, to run at large either upon the public streets or highways of the Township, private property of any other person or upon any other property not belonging to or in the possession of the owner of such animals or to persons under whose supervision or control such animals are being kept.

### MS4 Stormwater Fee Meetings in 2019

The Township is working with Light-Heigel and Associates, Inc. to develop a storm water fee to handle the costs of implementing the MS4 storm water program. **MS4 stands for: Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System.** Stakeholder meetings will begin in May. The MS4 Stakeholder committee is a group of township residents, businesses, and churches who will assist the Township in reviewing the MS4 budget and projects to determine the fee. The Fee will cover administrative costs, storm water projects, and storm water maintenance within the Township.

After the costs and impervious coverage is established, the stakeholder committee, staff and Light-Heigel and Associates will develop a fee based on impervious coverage which will be defined as Equivalent Residential Unit. The fee may be annually or quarterly.

Public meetings will be held sometime late summer and early fall. Please plan to attend to give the Township your valuable input on the process. Once meeting dates have been established, notices will be published in the Paxton Herald, at the Township Building and in the Township Newsletter.

## WHEN TO CALL 9-1-1

Not every cut requires stitches, nor does every burn require medical care. You may be confronted with the dilemma of whether to drive the person to the hospital or to call 9-1-1. According to the American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP), you should call 9-1-1 for help if you answer “yes” to any of these questions:

- ◆ Is the condition life-threatening?
- ◆ Could the condition get worse on the way to the hospital?
- ◆ If you move the person, will it cause further injury?
- ◆ Does the person need the skills or equipment of EMS?
- ◆ Would distance or traffic cause a delay in getting the person to the hospital?

If unsure about the answer to the above questions, call 9-1-1 and the trained dispatcher will advise you. It is better to be safe and call 9-1-1 when in doubt. ACEP also recommends the immediate transport of people with the following conditions:

- ◆ Difficult breathing, especially if it does not improve with rest
- ◆ Chest or upper abdominal pain or pressure lasting 2 minutes or more
- ◆ A fast heartbeat (more than 120 to 150 beats per minute) at rest, especially if associated with shortness of breath or feeling faint
- ◆ Fainting (passing out) or unresponsiveness
- ◆ Difficulty speaking, or numbness or weakness of any part of the body
- ◆ Sudden dizziness
- ◆ Confusion or changes in mental status, unusual behavior, or difficulty walking
- ◆ Sudden blindness or vision changes
- ◆ Bleeding from any wound that will not stop with direct pressure
- ◆ Broken bones visible through an open wound, or a broken leg
- ◆ Drowning
- ◆ Choking
- ◆ Severe burn
- ◆ Allergic reaction, especially if there is any difficulty breathing
- ◆ Extremely hot or cold body temperature
- ◆ Poisoning or drug overdose
- ◆ Sudden, severe headache
- ◆ Any sudden or severe pain
- ◆ Severe or persistent vomiting or diarrhea
- ◆ Coughing or vomiting of blood
- ◆ Behavioral emergencies (threatening to hurt or kill themselves or someone else)




