The Environmental Advisory Council (EAC) celebrates 30 years of service to West Hanover Township!

Since its inception in 1989, the EAC helped to create a community voluntary recycling program (now the curbside recycling program), oil and antifreeze collection/recycling, riparian buffer restorations, a scenic and big tree inventory, the rain garden at Fairville Park, a bluebird trail in Skyline Commons Park, stream assessments and wetland investigations to name a few of the projects.

The EAC also provides environmental education seminars such as integrated pest management, control of invasive plants and insects, stormwater education, household hazardous wastes and recycling. The West Hanover Township EAC was the first EAC in Dauphin County to produce a natural resource inventory, which is now part of the township's Comprehensive Plan, and played a major role in the establishment of the township's environmental and open space ordinances.

Unfunded Mandates usually result in additional debt for local governments. Borrowing money or raising taxes is often needed to pay for these projects.

Smoke Testing is Coming to West Hanover!

“I&I” is a short acronym for a huge problem most sewered communities face, **Inflow** and **Infiltration**. **Inflow** occurs when water is misdirected to the sewer system from outside sources such as manhole covers, floor drains and sump pumps (*please note*: the last two are prohibited from being connected to the public sewer as stated in *Authority Resolution 2017-A-1, Section 6*). **Infiltration** occurs when groundwater seeps in through cracks or loose joints in the pipes due to age, damage or root infiltration. Both of these issues represent a costly repair for us as we have nearly 50 miles of sewer system to maintain. Smoke can help us find these trouble areas so we can address them quickly and easily.

Smoke testing can be a very efficient and cost effective way to locate and identify the source of an inflow or infiltration problem. The smoke used is **non-toxic and does not leave any residue**. Smoke is applied under light pressure and will fill the sewer main and its connections. It will then follow the path of any leaks to the surface, quickly revealing the source of I&I. We will carefully check around houses with close attention given to cleanouts and roof leaders. Our crews will check for any escaping smoke, indicating a leak has been found. We may see smoke coming out of the grass, wooded areas, or cracks in the pavement. If smoke is found during the inspection, it will be carefully recorded on camera so that any problems can then be corrected. Best results are obtained when the water tables are low and on dry days since water is an excellent smoke barrier. Smoke testing is avoided on windy days because even a very light breeze can disperse a wisp of smoke before it is visible at the source of a leak.

Letters will be hand delivered and notices will be posted notifying residents of when the smoke testing will occur. Only the properties that are in the surrounding area will be notified. The letters will be delivered approximately two weeks in advance of the starting test date and will include all pertinent information for the homeowner or resident. In addition, a news release and smoke testing CAUTION letter will be posted on our website at www.whtsa.com and given to local officials, including the fire department and police, to let them know our plans. This is usually done one week prior to testing. The news release will include the days and exact locations of the testing, why we are doing the test and where they can expect to see smoke. Our phone number for questions will be included. Remember, the newsletter article is just a general forewarning. Your notification letter will cover all of the necessary details if you happen to live in the testing area.

This paired with upcoming fire prevention programs in October means that the fall is the perfect time to consider becoming a Fire Company volunteer. We are always looking for new members to help us serve and protect our community in a variety of roles. Today's volunteer fire companies are non-profit businesses in every sense of the word and as such a lot of administrative work goes on in the background to keep the fire engines rolling out the doors when called upon. We train on Tuesday evenings beginning at 6:30 at our Jonestown Road Station and our business meetings are held the first Tuesday of every month at 7:30. The fire company will pay for all training necessary to become a fire fighter in our community and evening and weekend classes are available.

SEVEN USES FOR FALLEN LEAVES

- 1. Spread leaves as a protective mulch to cover tender perennials or root crops/bulbs in the ground. The leaves will form a natural insulating cover that keeps the soil and the plants within a bit warmer over winter.*
- 2. Create a pile of leaves that will break down and form a crumbly, compost-like material called leaf mold. Even though leaf mold may sound like a blight, it's actually a good amendment to garden soil, improving its structure and ability to hold water. Leaf mold also attracts beneficial organisms that are vital in healthy soil.*
- 3. Brown leaves can be added to green materials in compost piles to improve the health of the compost being formed. According to the healthy living resource Care2, the ideal ratio is 75 percent brown to 25 percent green materials in compost. Turn compost piles regularly to aerate them.*
- 4. Store dried, mulched leaves in a dry spot so they can be used in the spring as a weed barrier for spring plantings. They will keep weeds at bay and help retain soil moisture to ensure small sprouts have the resources to grow.*
- 5. Use shredded leaves as a lawn supplement. Pass a lawn mower over leaves left on the lawn to break them down into pieces too small to rake. This will help keep the lawn healthy throughout the winter without blocking out needed sunlight.*
- 6. Bag dried leaves and pack them tightly together in cold areas of the home, such as basements or garages. They can act as added insulation. Bags of leaves also can be placed around planting containers to protect them from frost.*
- 7. Gather a few of the best-looking leaves and preserve them. Use an iron on a low setting and press leaves between two pieces of waxed paper until the waxed paper seals together. Or, use clear contact paper to achieve the same effect.*

7 Autumn Health Tips for Dogs & Cats By Dr. Laci Schaible

There is nothing quite like a crisp autumn breeze, beautiful foliage, and the smell of warm spices baking in the kitchen. Do beware though—fall ushers in a bushel of dangers for our furry companions. Here's how to keep your pets safe and healthy this season.

1. An increased need for food as the summer heat lessens up?

Several decades ago, your veterinarian may have recommended a slight increase in your pet's food consumption as the weather cooled and your pet required slightly more caloric intake to regulate his system. Today, however, things have changed. With a shocking number of pets categorized as obese and most dogs and cats are primarily house pets, this isn't a concern for most pet parents. If you do have a very fit working dog, a small increase may be a wise idea; with this said, an increase around 10% is probably all that is necessary. This does not mean an extra meal or an unlimited pass to treats.

2. School and home project supplies pose risks to curious pets.

While kids may be dedicated to keeping their school supplies tidy for the first week or so, at this point in the season, school supplies may be holding living rooms hostage. School glues, permanent markers, and pencils can all cause upset stomachs. Heavy-duty glues can cause serious blockages in the GI tract and even require surgery to remove them—and part of your pet's GI system. Make sure your children's projects stay covered up and are not accessible to your pets. Dogs in particular seem to like the flavor of glue.

This also goes for adults if you're doing home improvement projects now that the weather has cooled off. I once had to remove over 12" of small intestine from a dog when his owner ran to Lowe's in the middle of a flooring project. His dog "helped" in the owner's absence by ripping up the remaining linoleum and ingesting all the remaining glue. These accidents are easily avoided but repairing the damage is never as simple.

3. An apple a day?

As it turns out, apples are not the cure to health for Fido or Fluffy. If your dog likes to graze the ground for food, consider leaving Fido at home during your stroll of the apple orchards. While the flesh of ripe apples doesn't pose a problem for dogs or cats, apple stems, leaves and seeds are not so gentle. They can cause GI upset, decreased oxygen in the blood, decreased heart rate, difficulty breathing, seizures, coma, and even death. With reasonable preparation, the flesh of apples can make a suitable treat for dogs but cats are unlikely to enjoy the flavor of this fruit.

4. Fall is a prime season for mushrooms.

While most are non-toxic, dogs are highly susceptible to mushroom poisoning because of their wandering and scavenging behavior. Unfortunately, dogs are unable to sniff out the toxic ones, so the best way to avoid trouble is to keep pets away from areas where any mushrooms are growing. Dogs should be prevented from consuming mushrooms when they are being exercised. Profuse bloody diarrhea, vomiting, abdominal pain, dehydration, fever, and elevated heart rates characterize the initial phase of mushroom toxicity. Without treatment, the pet will succumb to liver and kidney failure within 3-7 days. As with most poisonings, prompt upper gastrointestinal decontamination and supportive care are critical elements of treatment.

5. Snakebite season is here.

Autumn is the season when snakes prepare for hibernation and are more likely to strike, increasing the possibility of bites to naive and curious pets. Be aware of what kinds of venomous snakes are in your area and avoid the areas they most often inhabit.

6. The fall season brings highly caloric foods and drinks that don't end with the Halloween candy bowl.

Sharing human treats can be dangerous and even deadly. Stay away from desserts, candies, fatty meat and trimmings, bones, gravies, calorie-dense casseroles, and seasoned sides. Don't forget garlic and onions are toxic! Many pet parents aren't aware of the many dangerous things that can happen, such as acute and life-threatening pancreatitis, a condition brought on when a pet ingests highly fatty foods.

A note for any season: Do you know the most popular flavor of dog medication? It's CHOCOLATE! Turns out we aren't the only ones that enjoy the rich flavor of cocoa beans. Dogs will go to great lengths, or counter-top heights, to indulge in this deadly vice so don't leave the candy bowl or kitchen counter unsupervised and within a paw's reach for a moment!

7. Consider adding pumpkin to your pet's diet if you are looking for a healthy nutritious seasonal treat.

Pumpkin, both raw and canned, is safe provided your pet is not suffering from a chronic condition such as kidney disease or diabetes. As far as our healthy pets go, seeds and flesh of fresh, raw or cooked pumpkins are safe. Fresh pumpkin is more nutritious than canned. If you choose to go with canned, make sure it doesn't have added sugar or sweeteners. An easy way to have some handy dog treats around that will last several weeks is roasting the seeds in the oven.




The West Hanover Township Board of Supervisor's have made the decision to liquidate the property known as Lot #2 as is and will not be restoring any of the structures on the property.

BE ON THE LOOKOUT FOR TREE OF HEAVEN

Tree of Heaven is a rapidly growing tree up to 80 feet in height and 6 feet in diameter. It has large leaf scars on the twigs. It will form dense, clonal thickets which displace native species and can rapidly invade fields, meadows and harvested forests. Leaves emerge very early in the spring before most native plants and this species holds onto its leaves a little longer in the fall than most native plants. Fall leaf color is yellow-green to yellow and occurs somewhat later than when most native plants exhibit fall coloration. This invasive tree species is extremely tolerant of poor soil conditions and can even grow in cement cracks. They are not shade tolerant, but easily invade forest edges causing habitat damage. Introduced as an ornamental, it was widely planted in cities because of its ability to grow in poor conditions. Management and control efforts for this species continue across the United States at great economic cost.

Another Big Tree Listing

The newest listing on the West Hanover Township Big Tree Registry is a lovely stand of spruce trees at the home of Nicolas and Marilyn Calderelli. In June the EAC evaluated the group of 8 trees, 6 Norway spruce and 2 red spruce. Mrs. Calderelli planted them in two phases in 1969 and 1974. The trees are very close together and serve as a windbreak, as well as a visual and sound barrier for their home at the entrance to White Birch Lane.

Spruces in general are tall, handsome trees and are often used in landscaping. Songbirds, hawks and owls find shelter in the dense branches. Gum made from the resin of Red and Black spruce was used to make the first chewing gum, before the discovery of chicle, which comes from a tropical tree. Native Americans made spruce beer by boiling the leafy young twigs with flavoring and sugar. Early explorers found it prevented scurvy and European sailors adopted it worldwide.

Anyone interested in proposing a tree for West Hanover's Big Tree Registry may pick up a brochure at the Township Building, or download it at the Big Tree Registry Link (under Government: EAC) at westhanover.com. After the owner's permission is received, EAC members will arrange to visit the tree, photograph it, and record its measurements. The data collected will be used to calculate a champion tree point score, which will be compared with the trees listed on the PA Big Tree website.


